Our friend Juliette Doman left this world last week after suffering a massive bleed on her brain. Juliette was involved in the Liverpool Social Centre Collective and the setting up of Next To Nowhere from its inception and embodied the values that we work by. She was passionate in the fight for justice and the protection of animals and the environment. She had a compassionate heart, and a cool head with an incisive analysis of the current neoliberal economic system and its devastating consequences for life on earth. It was Juliette who first proposed the idea of a safer spaces policy in Next To Nowhere – bringing along ideas learnt elsewhere to help us raise our expectations of how we treat each other. She

was also part of the setting up of AWOL – Angry/Amazing Women of Liverpool, Next To Nowhere's feminist group - Juliette was an amazing woman. Juliette believed in anarchism, and was inspired by the Zapatistas in Mexico whom she visited, and became committed to Latin American solidarity. She spent many years away from us in Guatemala co-ordinating the 'Mountain School' we heard so much about, which taught Spanish and helped prepare people for human rights work in the area. Juliette was recently doing her PhD supporting women who took the Guatemalan military to court for sexual war crimes, enduring a trial which was ultimately successful. Despite carrying the weight of such horrors on her shoulders Juliette was a joyful person who was a pleasure to be around, always smiling and laughing. At only 41 she has left us far too soon, but she made a huge impact in the time she was here, and will continue to inspire us in the struggle for justice, and the more compassionate world we all believe in.
